

GETTING A COVID-19 VACCINE



COVID-19 can make people sick and some people can die.



The COVID-19 vaccine can keep you from getting sick.

You will most likely go to the clinic or pharmacy to get your vaccine.



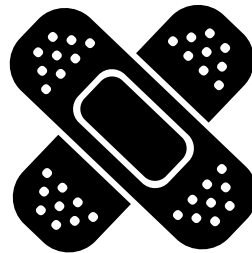
You will check in when you arrive and wait for the nurse to call your name.



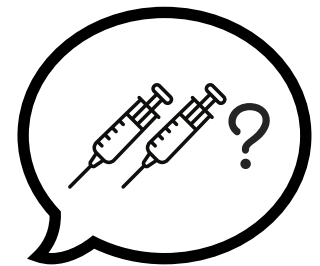
You will roll up your sleeve. The nurse will rub a cold wipe on your arm to clean it. It may smell strange.



You will need to sit very still. The nurse will put the vaccine in your arm. It will feel like a pinch or a prick.



The nurse will put a Band-Aid on your arm.



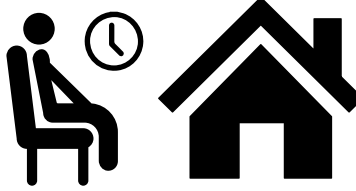
You should ask, "Do I need to come back later for a second COVID-19 vaccine?"



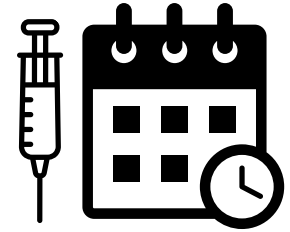
GETTING A COVID-19 VACCINE (CONTINUED)



If you need to get a second COVID-19 vaccine, schedule and write down your next appointment.



You will need to wait at least 15 minutes to make sure you have no rare side effects. Then you can go home.



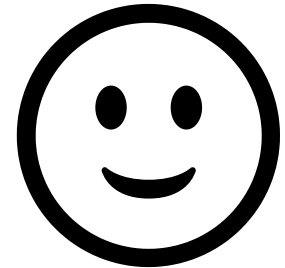
If you need to get a second COVID-19 vaccine, you will go back in 3 or 4 weeks.



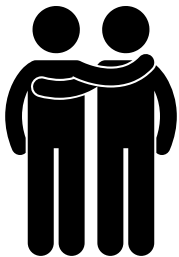
When you go back, you will go through the same steps to get your second vaccine.



After the vaccine, your arm may be sore. Your head may ache, and you may feel tired.



It means the vaccine is working. You will feel OK after a couple of days.



Two weeks after you get your final vaccine, you can get back to doing the things you love more safely.



You still need to wear a mask in areas where COVID-19 is spreading a lot. Masks are also recommended in schools, health care settings, and on public transportation.



You got your COVID-19 vaccine. You did your part to keep yourself and others safe and healthy!
